根據有意識社區基金會執行董事 2020 年的估計,世界各地約有 100,000 人以類似的方式生活。而這個數字近年來一直在上升。

我們是一個非階層化的社區,因此沒有個人負責。我們通過共識做出決策。

我們希望在這裡找到一種平衡,把更多的時間和精力投入到土地工作和變得更自給自足,而不是把所有的時間用於賺錢,為他人工作,然後把賺來的錢花在我們需要的生活必需品上,比如食物。

平均來說,人們每週工作一到兩天做其他工作,因為我們在這裡需要支付租金。這裡有挑戰,但外面的人們在日常生活中面臨的挑戰也很大。任何人都可以學習土地技能。任何人都可以學習決策過程。任何人都可以選擇以與周圍其他人和諧相處為優先的方式生活。有許多許多種生活方式可以比從世界上獲取更多。這只是其中的一個例子。
